## **Persevering in testing times**

Dear Friends,

It's been another very tough year for Myanmar. Besides the devastating effects of a pandemic that the country's health system was ill equipped to handle, in February the military initiated a coup. The full effects of the military action are yet to be felt, but the civil unrest and brutal reprisals indicate that worse is yet to come. It's a devastating turn of events for a country that has basically been in civil war for 60 years. The Civil Disobedience Movement seems strong despite the extra judicial killings, and there are many civilians in government, the health system and even the police, who have protested the coup. We know from research that during on-going violence there are many innocent casualties, and civilian deaths usually outnumber direct military casualties several times over. When resources are spent on war they're not being spent on the important things like healthcare and education. This latest coup will take years to heal and just as long to restore the economic development lost. Whether the end result is the beginning of a new 'Myanmar Spring' is yet to be seen.

These two very sad events have had a significant adverse effect on the work that Mon, our expatriate midwife, and our partner TRAD (Earth Mission Asia) in Kyauukyi have been able to undertake. The students have moved to the jungle location with lessons being done by Zoom and there has also been a delay in the commencement of building the Birthing Unit. Thankfully some things have gone well despite the challenges. The first cohort of graduating students have started work in remote clinics. The competence level of those in training and out in the field is high and there is anecdotal evidence of many lives being saved. We've been able to provide some great new technology at the jungle clinic in the form of an ultrasound machine and a solar fridge that provide increased services to patients.

The work in the slum area with Community Care Myanmar (CCM) was also affected by COVID and the coup. Classes were cancelled and scholarships not taken up during the year due to lockdowns. It's been an extremely difficult and testing time.

So it has been a tough year and there is little sign that it is going to improve in the near future. But, along with Mon, CCM and EMA, we look forward in hope. Our hope and prayer is that the next generation of young, excited and positive leaders can help lead in genuine change in the country. We ask for God to give them wisdom and strength so that indeed AK47s will be turned into silos and the heart of the people will turn towards shalom.





### Antenatal care continues



I think it's fair to say that 2021 has not been the reprieve from 2020 that globally many people were hoping for. This year has been especially challenging in Myanmar with consideration to be given to a grossly deteriorated political environment. With the health system under overwhelming pressure, it has increased the need for the services our clinic offers. The more challenges thrown at us, the more creative and resourceful our team has become. We have seen an increase in numbers coming to the clinic, and people coming from even further afield to seek health care. It has become a challenge to ensure that pregnant women are given the necessary minimum care; minimum number of antenatal visits, vitamins, immunisations and consideration of each of their pregnancies. We have picked up the pieces from the broken state system and are able to contribute to the shortfall of antenatal care and advice for safe birth in the area.

The third wave of COVID saw the township hospitals struggling to continue and for a while there were too many staff with COVID at the Kyaukkyi hospital and they were forced to close for a short period. Our clinic continued. We have noticed that when changes occur there is often a sudden drop in patient numbers, but after a week or so people start coming out like normal to the clinic. When we found out that we had been exposed to 2 patients with covid, we were recommended to quarantine our staff for two weeks and close the clinic. We took this opportunity to break down dividing walls to enlarge exam rooms, change the flow of clinic and create a larger spread-out waiting area and screening/reception area. It also opened the area where blood is collected and reduced contact with the cashier.

We had local seamstresses sew more PPE for us, and we implemented a new working system. We broke our team into 2 groups and worked alternate weeks. Midweek of our off week we would get a routine brain swizzling to test for covid! This has worked well at keeping our staff healthy and ensure we are not passing covid to our patients and reducing where possible the patients sharing covid to our staff. We continue to come into contact with patients who are covid positive, and our measures are limiting the passage of covid through us, but cannot eliminate all risk completely. It is a time of continually re-evaluating and thinking outside the box. This year has been a tragedy and our team are doing the best they can to keep things going in the face of extreme difficulty.

### **Testing times for children**

Children in Myanmar have not been able to attend school since early 2020 when the COVID pandemic first hit. So sadly our partner CCM who work in one of Yangon's largest slum communities, have not been able to resume classes in the new school building. It has been a very difficult time for these children. The team however have continued to regularly visit the families of the students and other community members to check on their well-being. And in co-operation with community leaders the CCM team have done regular distributions of food and other essential items. A total of 1,537 households were provided with food rations during the first half of 2021 as funds and safety permitted.





In the past most of these families depended on day labouring jobs, or selling items at the market for their family income. Now with COVID and the Coup their ability to earn any sort of money has disappeared. Inflation is another consequene of the Coup and now the families are finding that they can buy much less for their Kyat (Myanmar currency). The United Nations Development Program has said that half of Myanmar's population could plunge into by 2022, reversing poverty economic gains made over the last 16 years. A bleak outlook for the people living in Yangon's slum communities, who were already among the most vulnerable.
